

Warm and Cool Colors

During one of the coldest months of the year (in my part of the world) let us focus on the temperature of color.

When you describe a shade of pink you saw in the slightly scandalous window of Victoria's Secret to a friend you'll probably mention its value: whether it is light or dark. You may describe its intensity: whether it is dull or bright. And it would be most helpful, especially in the case of pink, and in the case of Victoria's Secret, to convey its temperature: whether it is a cool pink or a hot pink. Like intensity and value, temperature is a defining property of a hue.

In the big picture, cool colors contain blues and greens; warm colors contain red or orange.

Zoom in a bit closer and you'll see that every color has a warm and a cool version. Warm colors lean toward orange. Cool colors lean towards blue. Like fire and ice, orange and blue are the hottest and coolest colors on the wheel. The closer a hue is to orange, the warmer its temperature. Likewise, a hue closer to blue is cooler. A hot pink will be vibrant in intensity and more orange in temperature.


Temperature contrast is not just seen, it can be felt. Because warm colors stimulate circulation and cool colors slow it down, people in a room painted red-orange feel five to seven degrees warmer than in a room painted bluegreen.

The movie "The Polar Express" artfully works warm against cool colors with enchanting results. Its expansive vistas of snowy blues would leave viewers shivering if not for the luminous amber and yellow scenes of the train's interior. Looking from the frigid outside, flashes of yellow from within the windows invite and beckon. When we are inside the train, all is bathed in a radiant glow. Because of back-and-forth and side-by-side juxtapositions of hot and cold colors the whole movie visually sparkles.

If you are chilly in this first month of 2006, warm up by noticing the warmer colors inside: the fireplace, the food on the table, the orange, red, or yellow shades you may wear in your clothes.


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Out On A Loom is a creative journey through color, design, and form for the beginning to intermediate level seed bead artist.




